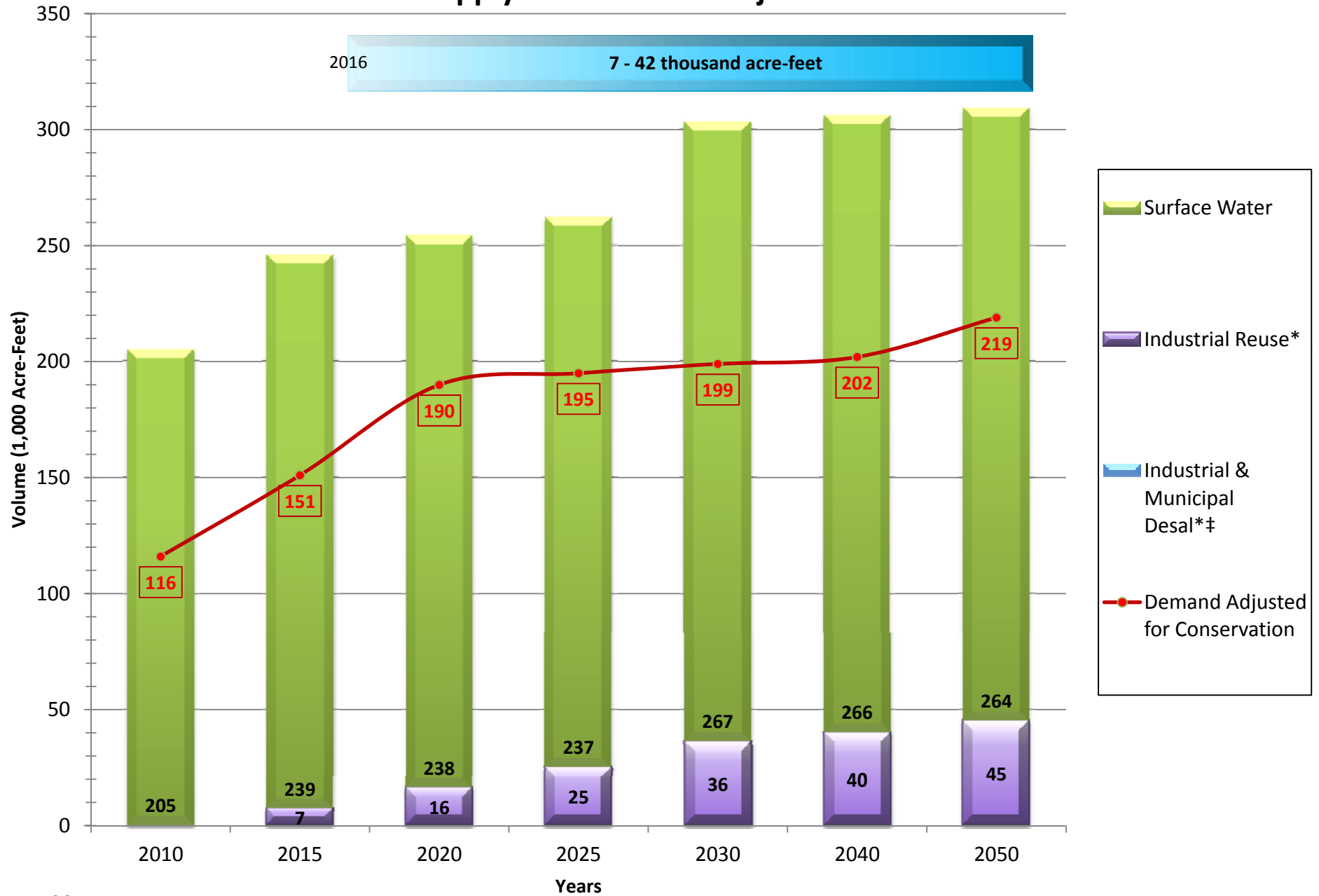

1. Includes municipal, current industrial, and treated wholesale. Future treated industrial customers are included in the "Future Industrial/Mining/Manufacturing" category.
2. Customers include municipal and industrial. The majority of growth in the projections is a result of several potential industrial customers. SPMWD is contracted with the City for 51,200 ac-ft/year, so projections in the 2025 and beyond would require a change in the contract. SPMWD also takes a negligible quantity of treated water.
3. For Nueces County/Corpus Christi; includes potential treated and/or raw water customers.
