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# Summary by Fund

FY 2026 Mid-Year Budget Adjustment

## General Fund:

- FY 2026 estimated savings \$0.3M
- FY 2027 estimated savings \$1.7M

## Parking Improvement Fund:

- Increase appropriation for new parking monitoring system in Code Compliance \$0.2M

## Type A/B Funds:

- Update Sales Tax revenue budgets
- Increase transfers to CIP projects

# FY 2027 General Fund Forecast

Presented May 19, 2026

	FY 2027 Forecast (in Millions)
<b>Beginning Balance</b>	<b>\$ 89.5</b>
Total Revenues	344.2
<b>Total Funds Available</b>	<b>433.7</b>
Total Operating Expenses	362.2
Reserve for Contingencies 20%	72.4
<b>Ending Balance</b>	<b>\$ (0.9)</b>

## Revenue Assumptions:

- 1.3% increase in property tax revenue (\$1.4M)
- 1% increase in sales tax revenue (\$0.7M)

## Cost Assumptions:

- \$1.3M for Police Collective Bargaining (Year 4 of 4)
- \$2.0M for Fire Collective Bargaining (Year 3 of 4)
- \$7.1M for Health Benefits contributions by the City for all employees



# General Fund Forecast

- The last two fiscal years, the City has taken proactive steps to identify recurring savings
  - FY 2024 overcame a \$12M revenue shortfall
  - FY 2025 overcame a \$7M revenue shortfall
  - FY 2026 forecast is \$0.9M revenue shortfall
- Cities across Texas are facing shortfalls ranging from \$12M to \$65M

San Antonio	\$65.3M
Fort Worth	\$49M
Austin	\$26.4M
El Paso	\$12M
Corpus Christi	\$0.9M



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# FY 2026 General Fund Mid-Year Adjustments

## Planning & Economic Development

- \$69K: Transfer Parking Enforcement to Code Compliance (Reduce 7 positions; 6 filled, 1 vacant)
- \$0: Reduce Parking Manager and revenue from Parking Improvement Fund for Parking Manager (1 position; 1 vacant)
- \$50K: Reduce operating cost for Parking Enforcement
- \$(26K): Reduce revenue for Parking Meter Collections
- \$32K: Reduce 1 Assistant Director (1 position; 1 filled)
- \$51K: Reduce 2 Planning positions (2 positions; 2 vacant)

*Positions that are filled will be reduced effective August 1, 2026*

*Impacted employees will fall under the Reduction in Force (RIF) policy through July 31, 2026*

## Parking Enforcement (General Fund)

Parking Meter Revenue	\$95,374
Operating Cost	\$676,271
Cost to General Fund	\$580,897

### Recommended Changes:

- Transfer Parking Enforcement to Code Compliance
- No paid parking
- Time-limited parking on Chaparral St. and Water St.
- Savings to General Fund: \$580,897

# FY 2026 General Fund Mid-Year Adjustments

## Parks & Recreation

- \$39K: Reduce 1 Assistant Director (1 position; 1 vacant)

## Code Compliance

- \$65K: Reduce 4 positions (4 positions; 4 vacant)
  - 1 Administrative Support III
  - 1 Code Compliance Manager
  - 1 Sr. Code Compliance Officer
  - 1 Code Officer I
- Remaining: 28 Code Officers and 2 Code Officer Supervisors



## Recap FY 2026 General Fund Mid-Year Adjustments and Savings to the FY 2027 General Fund

	FY 2026 Budget Adjustment	FY 2027 Savings
Planning & Economic Development	\$176K	\$1,200K
Parks & Recreation	\$39K	\$200K
Code Compliance	\$65K	\$336K
<b>Total Savings to General Fund</b>	<b>\$280K</b>	<b>\$1,736K</b>



# Parking Improvement Fund

Increase budget by \$200,000 for new parking strategy one-time expenses:

- Code Compliance vehicle cameras for enforcement
- Parking Meter removal
- Signage for time-limited parking
- Painting curbs and parking stripes



# Type A Funds (Old Authorization)

- Approved by Type A Board May 18, 2026
- Increase revenue for Sales Tax collected on sales through March 31 (\$6.1M)
- Appropriate funding for administrative expenses of \$100
- Appropriate funding for transfers to capital projects:
